CHAIRMAN SILVA: Our next order of business is 3 4 the finance report --Chairman --5 SECRETARY LONGHINI: 6 CHAIRMAN SILVA: I'm sorry. 7 SECRETARY LONGHINI: Can we -- the minutes. 8 CHAIRMAN SILVA: Our first order of business is 9 the approval of the committee minutes of 10 August 10, 2022. May I have a motion to approve? 11 DIRECTOR ORTIZ: So moved. 12 DIRECTOR MILLER: Second. 13 SECRETARY LONGHINI: Moved by Director Ortiz. 14 Seconded by Director Jakes. Director -- I'm sorry. 15 Seconded by Director Miller. Director Jakes? 16 DIRECTOR JAKES: Yes. 17 SECRETARY LONGHINI: Director Ortiz? 18 DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Yes. CHAIRMAN SILVA: Our next order of business is the finance report. Jeremy Fine.

MR. FINE: Thank you. Good morning. Jeremy Fine, your Chief Financial Officer. And I'll be going through the results for July as where -- as well as year-to-date numbers. With regard to our revenues for July, you see they're following a similar trend for the first six months of the year where we see fare and pass totals slightly above budgeted expectations for about \$700,000 on both an amended and original budget basis. Reduced fare subsidy continuing to come in as expected. Albeit it has been cut since 2015. Non-farebox totals continue to come in positive by about \$700.000 on both an amended budget and original budget basis and then total revenue for the month of July we see a positive variance of about 1.4 million both on an amended and original budget basis. For the month we're about 2.7 million dollars better than where we were in July of '21. On the next page you see year-to-date numbers. Following a similar type form for each of

the various lines. We drop down to the bottom for total revenues. So we see total revenues coming in about 5.1 million dollars better than the amended budget and about 4.5 million dollars better than the original budget on a year-to-date basis. The variance to 2021 year-to-date is very positive to the tune of about 46.1 million dollars. So a lot better than where we were this time last year.

they're following a similar positive trajectory.

We see labor coming in a little under than

14 million dollar of positive variance to both the amended and original budgets. Material essentially flat. Slightly positive. Fuel and power continue to see positive variance on both of those lines and then injuries and damages and security services coming in essentially flat or slightly positive and other expenses coming in positive by about

4.5 million dollars. So overall for the month of July we see expenses coming in a little under

22 million dollars of positive variance both on an amended and original budget basis.

Year-to-date numbers follow a similar type form. Dropping down to the bottom line here. The



total operating expenses for the amended budget are a positive 74.3 million dollars and on an original budget basis a little over 107 million dollars of positive variance. Again if you factor in the positive variance that we see on the revenue side, those numbers are about 79.4 million on the amended budget and then about 112 million dollars on the original budget on year-to-date numbers. positive variance on our public -- or on our system generated revenues and expenses coupled with our public funding has allowed us to do smaller draws which we'll talk about more in a moment. Public funding as I mentioned is coming in positive. see here for the month of July we see again positive variance on sales tax by about two and a half million dollars. PTF coming in about a million and a half to 2 million dollars favorable. The real estate transfer tax essentially flat. Slightly positive, slightly negative based on the amended budget or original budget basis. And then PTF on RETT and ICE coming in at budget. overall for the month of July we see about two and a half million dollars of positive variance to the amended budget and about five and a half million

dollars of positive variance to the original budget. If you flip to the next page, you see how this rolls up on the year-to-date basis. And again versus the amended budget we see about 20.5 million dollars of positive variance there and a little over 50 million dollars. 50.4 million dollars of positive variance versus the original budget. Again public funding coming in positive. System generated revenues and expenses coming in positive had allow -- have allowed us to make smaller draws on our public relief funding that we received from the federal government. And you see that on the next page.

You see here that we're only drawing about 2.4 million dollars of funds for the month. You see that we're drawing now against CRRSAA, ARP and ARP discretionary. We will continue to do this as long as those funds, you know, are still available for use until they're extinguished. And this is the first draw that we're making against ARP discretionary funding. But again we'll -- we've teed it up so that we'll make active draws on a monthly basis against all three outstanding grants that we've received for federal relief. You see on



the -- one of the right columns here percentage of drawn total allocation. We're still hovering around that 40 percent of total allocation drawn so that we still have a little over 1.3 billion dollars remaining. That should get us through most if not all of 2025. We'll be talking more about that in detail as we start talking about the 2023 budget and forecast for '24 and '25 but again based on preliminary estimates that should carry us well into 2025 if not through it.

with regard to the commodities that we have that we purchase here with regard to fuel, power and natural gas, we are locked in for the foreseeable future where we need to be on all three commodities. We've locked in for where we want to be for '22 and '23 for fuel. We'll look for selective opportunities for additional purchases in '24 and '5 as prices avail themselves. And we'll look for also additional opportunities for power and natural gas as we move forward as well. That concludes my prepared remarks. I'm glad to answer any questions regarding July numbers or year-to-date numbers.

CHAIRMAN SILVA: Jeremy, the recovery ratio



included federal stimulus. Will the 2023 include 1 federal stimulus and how much is that going to be? 2 3 MR. FINE: Yeah. So we -- we still have the 4 ability to use the funding for -- for the 5 calculation and we also have a waiver from the state government for '22 and '23 as well. So we do 6 7 have the ability to continue to use those funds. 8 you know, but we also have that waiver in hand. 9 You know, the -- the most important thing is is continuing to work with the RTA, the service boards 10 11 and other transit advocates for, you know, 12 long-term relief with regard to the recovery ratio as well as the additional funding that we may need 13 as we move forward when the federal funding -- the 14 15 federal relief funding runs out. So we do have 16 temporary relief but again we're working with the 17 RTA, the service boards and other transit advocates 18 to make sure that we have more stability in both the recovery ratio but also, you know, more 19 20 importantly in a lot of ways just on a cash basis 21 with additional funding. 22 CHAIRMAN SILVA: Thank you. 23 SECRETARY LONGHINI: Director Barclay, any
